On the <u>24th of August</u>, several nurses from Egang Egang Desa Clinic, Bum Bum Island were present to give MR injections, which are Measles and Rubella injections, to more than 20 of our students. The injection is targeted at children aged 9 months to 8 years. Yet, there are still many children who miss out on the opportunity to receive these shots due to not having time to gather all the children in the Omadal Island community.

We would like to express our highest appreciation to the Egang Egang Desa Clinic for providing this opportunity free of charge to all including children without a country. We believe health is a right of every human regardless of background.





- Sabah and National day celebration

We are delighted to provide an update on baby Adli's progress. He has successfully been discharged from the Special Care Nursery at Hospital Tawau and is now safely in the arms of his mother, Kenang. Convincing Kenang to stay at the hospital was initially quite difficult; after her first night, she was overwhelmed and wanted to go home. However, with our supportive encouragement, she decided to stay for another night, though she still felt unprepared. Remarkably, by the third night, she agreed to continue without hesitation, showing true bravery as she overcame her fears for the sake of her child.

treatments, including blood transfusions and laser surgery for retinopathy of prematurity. Thankfully, the bleeding in his eyes has diminished, requiring monitoring every two weeks until he reaches 50 weeks of age.

While we have managed to secure a kind donor and funding for formula milk for the next two years, we urgently need financial assistance to facilitate Adli's frequent checkups. He has five medical appointments scheduled in the coming months. We are immensely grateful for the generosity of our donors and kindly ask for continued support to ensure Adli's health and recovery. Thank you for keeping baby Adli in your thoughts and prayers.

Here's her reason to apply for the awards for Iskul:



Our own children are particularly privileged, but we are all connected; a global community, which is only as strong as its weakest link (Ee Chia's guiding light). I am humbled by Ee Chia's commitment to walking the talk and in establishing Iskul and continuing to advocate tirelessly for the Bajau Laut community and persisting in ensuring that the Bajau Laut children (some if not all) have access to education and basic health and I see applying for the Wall Project as an synergistic opportunity to join two initiatives with goals that dovetail perfectly.

On a personal note, my life path post-Grinnell led me home to Malaysia briefly, and then the UK, and a dozen other countries as a humanitarian aid worker before settling down in France. I've always been asked "Why

that I do not have to justify my life choices to others, this has always been something at the back of my mind and I have always kept an eye open for ways in which I could contribute towards helping make a positive change happen in Malaysia.
